ALA Advocacy Bootcamp

A joint program of ALA's Office for Intellectual Freedom and Office for Library Advocacy, this workshop urges attendees to re-think advocacy; to re-define the library community and expand the way we have been advocating for libraries. Typically held as a pre-conference at state and regional conferences, Advocacy Bootcamp will help library communities prepare to advocate for libraries as fundamental building blocks to democracy. In this joint effort of ALA's Office for Library Advocacy and the Office for Intellectual Freedom, we'll explore some of the brutal facts about our current environment, celebrate our assets, and offer practical tips to reclaim a moral sanction for the work we do, and the support our communities deserve.

The program will cover advocacy basics such as messaging, networking and community engagement. Intellectual Freedom basics will also be covered. Attendees will focus on working on an advocacy plan that they can implement in their library. NOTE: This workshop is strongly encouraged for any NLA member wishing to serve on the Advocacy Committee.

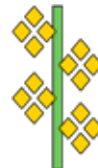

DIY Evaluation & Assessment: Measuring Quality & Impact of Library Services to Communicate Relevance

He maintains an ongoing line of research focused on libraries as strategic organizations, communication within libraries, the human-technology interface, and the role of critical theory in both librarianship and teaching. His research is interdisciplinary in nature drawing upon anthropology, communication studies, information science, and sociology.

Emily Drabinski is Associate Professor and Coordinator of Library Instruction at Long Island University, Brooklyn. She sits on the editorial board of *Radical Teacher*, a journal of socialist, feminist, and anti-racist teaching practice and edits *Gender & Sexuality in Information Studies*, a book series from Library Juice Press/Litwin Books. The Opioid Epidemic: Is it Relevant for Nebraska Libraries?

A Textbook Program is NOT for Us! Re-Imagining Failure Into New Possibilities
